READING ROUTINES AND SCREEN TIME

Back-to-school is a great time for parents to establish a daily reading routine at home and set limits around screen time—the amount of time children spend on smartphones, tablets, computers, and TV. Here are some other stats that may surprise you:

- The time children 8 and under spend on mobile devices has **tripled** since 2013
- **42%** of children 8 and younger now have their own tablet devices, compared to less than 1% in 2011
- 23% miss sleep and feel tired because they have spent too long on their devices
- 42% of parents say the TV is on "always" or "most of the time" in the home

New research shows children's brain activity runs "cold" when they listen to an audiobook and "hot" when they see a book on an electronic screen, but "just right" when they are read a children's picture book. This "Goldilocks Effect" proves children's books are a great learning tool.

Establishing a <u>reading routine</u> is great for developing children's vocabulary and comprehension, and bonding with parents. It's as easy as doing the 4 steps on the right!

Students with strong emotional self-regulation pick up on early literacy skills quicker than their peers who aren't able to self-regulate.




