### ATTENDANCE CHECK & LATE SLIPS

Students arriving late to school need to stop at the office, sign in and get a late slip. There will be a binder located just outside the office for students to sign their name and this will give us a better way to track and monitor these arrivals.

Because attendance is taken electronically, absences are recorded at the office immediately, and cannot be changed by teachers in the classroom. As well, office staff need to know your student has arrived so they do not begin making phone calls to verify your child's whereabouts. In the event your child/ren will be absent for a portion or all of the day, please call the school office 780-467-7751 or go to our website and click on the "Report a Student Absence" button on the left hand side to report the absence. Our voice mail is always on for your convenience, and messages are checked regularly. Generally, if the school has not heard from a parent by 9:00 a.m. we will call you at home or work to verify your child's whereabouts.

### IMPROVING HOME & SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

To enhance communication between families and schools, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) has developed a how-to guide entitled, "Communication Protocol for Schools." Topics include appropriate channels to use, standard formats and structures, timing and sequencing for regular and ongoing home-school communication, and ways to bring forward questions or concerns. The manual also offers useful tools and resources schools and families can use to enhance face-to-face meetings, email communication and various social media efforts.

### MILK



Westboro Elementary has a milk program. We offer white and chocolate milk for purchase. Milk tickets can now be purchased online through the Parent Portal. There are two options available: 10 tickets and 20 tickets. The options can be found at the bottom under School Items. Or students can purchase milk tickets at the office. The cost is \$1.00 per ticket. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact our office.



### STUDENT DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP

Parents we would ask you to please respect our drop off and pick up times. Students are to be dropped off at the school no earlier than 8:20 a.m. in the morning as this is when supervision begins.

After school, students are to be **picked up promptly at 3:12 p.m.** We are also very fortunate to have a child care centre on site if you require child care before or after these times.

Finally, please be aware of the challenges caused by changes in students taking buses or being picked up. In order for us to be able to communicate these changes and requests to your child successfully, it is IMPERATIVE that you let the office know, no later that 2:30 p.m. Often your child's class may need to be located and the message delivered. This is nearly impossible when the call is received after 2:30. Thank you for your assistance in this matter!

### **MEDICATIONS & ALLERGIES**

If medication is to be administered to your child at school a form must be completed by the parent/guardian. The medication must be brought to school in the original container. Please request a Medication Administration form from the office. Forms must be completed on a yearly basis.

Westboro School is a **Nut Aware school**. Please remember to be cautious when choosing the food items your child will bring to school. There are a number of students who have severe allergies and we wish to provide a safe environment for each individual and staff. In addition, we ask students not to share their food and ask parents to refrain from sending in any nut products. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

Individual student photographs will be taken on **September 16th**. Kindergarten **Regular** pictures will be taken on September **17th** at approximately 1 p.m. These photographs are offered on a proof basis. Each student will have two personal portraits taken and proofs will be sent home for viewing. An order form and in-

### PARKING & SAFETY

Our school zone is a very busy place before and after school. Ensuring our students safety is our first priority. Parents are reminded of the speed zone in the area in front of the school, as well as be reminded that there are no U-turns allowed anywhere within the school boundaries.

Please note that there is *no parking or stopping* in front of the school during drop off and pick-up times. That area is designated for buses only. There is also **no parking in the STAFF PARKING lots** on the east and west sides of the school. The staff parking stalls are ALL spoken for and any quick drop offs or pick ups can cause great disruptions for our staff. There is parking available in the mall parking lot across from the school, *in the middle and outer* (closest to Broadmoor Blvd.) *rows ONLY*. Please obey all the cross walk markings during the busy times in the mornings and afternoons. Students will continue patrolling the crosswalk areas, please respect their requests as they assist Mr. Lastiwka and Mrs. Werner in supervising the arrival and departure of our students.

- Enter a password and then enter it again to verify that it is correct.

Once registered, you will be logged into the website. Important Note: You need to know your child's teacher & class number before you can continue.

- 1. Please add your children by clicking on the "STUDENTS" button below or the "PROFILE" menu tab in order to proceed. It is important to add all the students first, before placing an order.


### TERRY FOX "TOONIE" RUN

### Signs and Symptoms of Youth Drinking and Drug Use

### How can I tell if my child is using drugs or alcohol?

This can be challenging when we consider changes that are common for a pre-teen or teenager such as changes in moods or attitudes, different sleeping habits and changes in hobbies and interest.

### What should you look for?

You can also look for signs of depression, anxiety, withdrawal, carelessness with grooming or hostility. Ask yourself, is your child still doing well in school.

### WATCH LIST FOR PARENTS

- Changes in friends
- Negative changes in schoolwork, missing school, declining grades
- Increased secrecy about possessions or activities
- Use of incense, room deodorant, or perfume
- Subtle changes in conversations with friends (more secretive coded language)
- Change in clothing choices clothes that highlight drug use
- Increase in borrowing money
- Bottles of eye drops
- New use of mouthwash or breath mints to cover up smell of alcohol
- Missing prescription drugs painkillers, mood stabilizers, narcotics
- Evidence of drug paraphernalia such as rolling papers, pipes

### **DIVISION NEWS**

### EIPS LAUNCHES NEW CELL PHONE POLICY

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) Board of Trustees has approved a new policy regarding cellphones. *Policy 24, Personal Communication Devices* outlines how students and staff use cellphones and personal devices within EIPS schools. The goal: To ensure all students use technology responsibly and develop skills in digital citizenship.

To develop the policy, the Board undertook a comprehensive review of the Division's existing procedures and practices used to oversee the use of student-owned technology in the classroom. It also conducted extensive public consultations with students, teachers, school administrators and EIPS families. Overall, the feedback was invaluable and provided a clear picture of how to best manage the use of these devices.

### Policy highlights:

Students in kindergarten to Grade 6: No access to cellphones or personal devices during the school day, including during breaks and the lunch hour - the only exception, students with a diagnosed medical condition or an identified inclusive-educational need.

The purpose of the policy is to ensure learning takes place in an environment with fewer distractions. When students can focus on what's taking place in the classroom and can interact directly with the teacher and other students, they're in a better position to grow and succeed.

Students are strongly encouraged to NOT bring any devices to school. If a student does, the device must stay in his/her backpack.

Students caught using any devices will be told to bring it down to the office and they can pick the device up at the end of the school day.

### **UPDATE YOUR POWERSCHOOL INFORMATION**

The <u>PowerSchool Correction and Verification Form</u> is now available online, which replaces the paper form sent to families each fall. Families can use the form to access and update their child's information—including address, parent and guardian information, emergency contacts and any medical information. Reviewing and updating the form ensures the school has the most up-to-date information regarding your child. All Westboro Elementary families are asked to review their child's PowerSchool Correction and Verification Form by Sept. 20, 2019.

For more information about the PowerSchool Correction and Verification Form and opt-out options contact the school directly.

*NOTE:* Parents or guardians who've opted out of having the Correction and Verification Form visible on PowerSchool, will receive a paper version to review from the school.

### PAY SCHOOL FEES ONLINE

School fee information for the 2019-20 school year is expected to be posted on the PowerSchool Parent Portal by late September. All fees are due within 30 days of being posted. To access your fee information, simply log in to the <u>PowerSchool Parent Portal</u> and go to "Student Fees." There you can view your fees and pay online using Visa, MasterCard or INTERAC Online—when available from your financial institution.

Don't forget to log in to the PowerSchool Parent Portal regularly throughout the year. Fees are often added to your child's account to cover the cost of certain school activities such as field trips, class projects, athletic-team fees and more.

If circumstances exist where you are unable to pay your student fees, you can apply to have <u>fees waived</u> by submitting an <u>Application for a Waiver of Fees</u>. The application deadline is Dec. 15, 2019.

### QUICK FACTS: VIDEO SURVEILLANCE

Did you know each EIPS bus is equipped with video surveillance? Video surveillance and equipment helps:

- ensure the safety of all students, drivers and property; and
- discourage destructive acts.

On a regular basis, EIPS Student Transportation reviews the video recordings, in accordance with the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (FOIP). The recordings assist the department with monitoring student and driver conduct and may be used as evidence in a disciplinary matter.

### **CAREGIVER EDUCATION SERIES**

The Division, in partnership with Alberta Health Services and Elk Island Catholic Schools, is hosting a series of caregiver information sessions focused on ways to support students' mental health. The sessions are free and geared toward parents, caregivers, teachers and community members who want to learn more about challenges impacting children and adolescents. This year, session topics include anxiety, ADHD, depression, self-harm, technology, teens and teaching leadership skills, and more.

### ENHANCING LITERACY AND NUMERACY

As part of Elk Island Public Schools' (EIPS) ongoing efforts to enhance the literacy and numeracy of students in all grade levels, the Division is once again administering the STAR 360 and Math Intervention/Programming Instrument (MIPI) assessment tools in the 2019-20 school year. The tools focus on literacy and numeracy, are digitally based and offer an opportunity for students to demonstrate their learning. The goal: To provide timely information to teachers, help enhance classroom instruction and ensure student learning needs are identified.

In September and May, EIPS students in grades 1 through 12 will complete the STAR 360 assessment, which evaluates reading comprehension. The assessment takes approximately 20 minutes and is administered on a digital device. Also, in September, students in grades 2 through 10 will complete the MIPI assessment, which is a mathematic screening tool used to inform teachers about a student's math skills. For students in grades 7 through 10, the MIPI takes approximately 50 minutes, and for students in grades 2 through 6 it takes approximately 20 minutes. The results offer the teacher a clearer picture of a student's learning needs and help determine if subsequent instructional planning is required.

The scores of the assessments aren't used toward a student's grade, and there is no need to study ahead of time. The tools simply provide the teacher with information to better understand where each student is in terms of reading comprehension and mathematic ability. If, after analyzing the results, it's determined a student can benefit from extra support, the teacher will contact the family to discuss possible support strategies.

### **EMERGENCY DRILLS**

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, SCHOOLS CONDUCT TRAINING AND DRILLS to help better prepare students and staff for possible emergency situations. When a school is confronted with an emergency, staff will assess the situation and then decide on a course of action. Schools conduct drills throughout the year to rehearse emergency procedures. These exercises prepare students and staff to act quickly and help to minimize a child's fear during a real emergency. In addition to the procedures described below, schools also practice protocols such as "Drop-Cover-Hold," a method of protecting vital body parts during some natural disasters, and conduct fire drills. All staff and students are required to participate in these drills. We attempt to run our drills during warm weather so that students do not need to go outside in sub-zero temperatures.

**Lock-Down**: Lock-Downs are usually used in response to acts or threats of violence to students and/or staff directly impacting the school. During a Lock-Down all doors to and within the school are locked. No one is permitted in or out of any area once it has been locked. Students and staff must respond very quickly to a Lock-Down command to get to a safe location before doors are locked. No one, other than law enforcement, is permitted access to the building until the Lock-Down is over.

**Hold and Secure:** Hold and Secure is used in response to security threats or criminal activity outside the school. During a Hold and Secure, all entrance doors to the school are locked, with no one permitted in or out of the building. No one, other than law enforcement, is permitted access to the building until the Hold and Secure has been cleared.

**Shelter-in Place:** Generally, Shelter-in-Place is used during an environmental emergency, such as severe storms or chemical spills. During a Shelter-in-Place, students and staff retreat to safe zones to seek shelter. This includes having students or staff who are outdoors come back into the school. Each school's emergency response plan identifies the safest location for its occupants and how to seal a room from hazardous conditions. Students will not be released or dismissed until the situation has been resolved.

**Evacuation:** An Evacuation requires all students and staff to leave the school and go to an alternate location. This may mean only going outside and away from the building until it is safe to re-enter the school. In other cases, students and staff may need to go to an evacuation center. Parents will be informed of the alternate location through the school's Crisis Notification Network.
