

The deadline for donations is December 5, 2019.



COMMUNICATING STUDENT LEARNING OR CSL

We are pleased to be sharing your child's report card with you on November 30th: "Communicating Student Learning", or "CSL" was created by Elk Island teachers, administrators, parents, students, and central office personnel. To digitally access your child's report card, you will need to either log into your PowerSchool Parent Portal, or create your PowerSchool Parent Portal account. Both can be found at: https://powerschool.eips.ca/public/home.html

If you require a paper copy of the report card, please contact your child's teacher and we will be happy to print one off for you.

The Parent Portal allows parents the capacity to create a single sign on for all students in one family who are currently registered in elementary, junior high and senior high schools in Elk Island Public Schools. Once the account is created, parents will be able to manage their own account information and to link all of their students to one account. This account will remain in effect for the duration of the student's enrollment in Elk Island Public Schools. If you are currently registered in the Parent Portal with junior and/or senior high students, you will now be able to add the elementary student. There is no need to create a new account. A video demonstrating the steps to creating a PowerSchool parent portal account is found at: http://www.eips.ca/powerschool. If you are having difficulty logging into your PowerSchool Parent Portal, please contact us at school.

Once you set up and/or log into your account, click on the "Communicating Student Learning" button. This will take you to the report card.

Click on a scale to view a description of the scale 4 levels.





Click on the to expand subjects or comments.

If you wish to print the report card, scroll to the bottom of the page and click on the "print" button. You can either print the condensed or full version.

COUNSELLOR'S CORNER

Hello WBO Warrior parents/guardians. It is not uncommon for parents to experience times when you simply don't know what to do or say when your child does not listen or follows directions. What happens when your child does not follow through with taking out the garbage, or your 4 year old tantrums dominate the household, or your nine-year old seems to fight you every step of the way from getting ready for school or doing homework or dinner/computer/television time?

Here is some universal advice from Amanda Morin's book, *The Everything Parent's Guide to Special Education*.

Examples to look for when a child has trouble following directions:

- Get easily frustrated or cry when trying to do something
- Refuse to do things that seem simple
- Agree to do something and then not do it
- Walk away from doing homework or a chore
- Look away or zone out when you are giving directions
- Get halfway through a task and then stop
- Say they did something when they did not

Such behaviours can be more than children just "not listening" or refusing to follow directions. If you notice your child gets frustrated often, track what you see in a Frustration Log. Also, follow-up with your child's teacher to see if the same type of behaviors are happening in school. Sometimes it's a matter of memory or planning out tasks. Children who struggle with executive functioning skills have trouble remembering what you just said or keeping track of the steps involved in big or small tasks. They can complete the first step such as "go brush your teeth" but forget to wash their face.

A second reason children may struggle to follow directions is that they are not focused. Distractions from the TV or siblings in the background can make it harder for them to "hear" your directions. Or they may be thinking about their own thoughts. Some children need longer time to process information and complete the job.

Tips for helping your child become better at following directions:

- Ask your child to look at your before you give a direction
- Give short and simple instructions
- Download picture schedules for daily routines
- Research tips for helping your child learn organization skills

COUNSELLOR'S CORNER CONT'D

Tips for helping your child become better at following directions (continued):

- Tell your child you can see that following directions is difficult and that's OK. Role model to your child how to find ways to make following directions easier (i.e., self-talk steps).
- Avoid giving a lot of criticism to your child for not listening as getting angry and losing
 your patience will impact the child's self-esteem. Instead, recognize your child's strengths.

If your child's behaviors are escalating, seek your family doctor for further exploration.

Also, Strathcona County offers various workshops on fostering a child's social skills, self-esteem, anxiety, and stress; including positive parenting courses. Visit: strathcona.ca/parentsupport or call 780-464-4044.

The Pot (Cannabis) Talk

Pot (Cannabis) is often the first drugs a teen is offered Did you know? The rate of pot use is two times higher among Canadian youth aged 15 – 24 as it is for adults.

One in five teens aged between 15 and 19 have used pot (cannabis) in the past year.

Terms for Cannabis:

Marijuana, bud, blunt, chronic, dab, dope, ganja, grass, green, hash, herb, joint, loud, mary jane, mj, pot, reefer, skunk, smoke, trees, wax, weed.

Short-term effects of use:

Feeling happy, relaxation, increased sociability and heightened sensation; problems with memory and learning; distorted perception (sights, sounds, time, touch); trouble with thinking and problem solving; increased heart rate and anxiety.

Long-term effects of use:

Increased risk of experiencing psychotic symptoms (changes in thoughts, feelings and behaviours) poor performance in school, lower grades and risk of dropping out; impairment of cognitive abilities; increase risk of chronic cough, bronchitis; may also increase depression and anxiety – stress tolerance level is lowered.

Cannabis and the teen brain

The pre-frontal cortex, the part of the brain that controls reasoning and impulses, does not fully mature until around the age of 25. The use before the age of 25 can have a negative impact such as: more risky, impulsive behaviour, poor planning and judgement, and difficulty controlling emotions.

You are the expert when it comes to your teen. If something doesn't feel right, it probably isn't. Talk to them – early and openly...

EIPS DIVISION NEWS

INCLEMENT WEATHER

With the winter season almost here, we want to remind families to dress children appropriately for the weather when getting ready for school or the bus. The weather often changes unexpectedly throughout the day, so please select suitable outerwear and ensure your child is prepared for changing conditions.

If inclement weather conditions occur, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) advises families of any bus cancellations using various communications tools - automated-telephone messages, alerts posted on www.eips.ca and school websites, Twitter, Facebook, local radio stations and on Versatrans My Stop. Morning bus cancellations are posted on www.eips.ca by 6:30 a.m.

Decisions regarding bus cancellations are guided by EIPS administrative procedures that states, "school bus service may be suspended...when Environment Canada reports a temperature of -40 C." Other reasons for suspending or delaying school bus services include adverse weather and poor road condition. When school bus services are suspended, schools remain open to students. EIPS believes families have the right and responsibility to make choices for their children based on their beliefs and perceptions of safety during times of inclement weather.
