KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION IS NOW OPEN

Is your child turning five on or before Dec. 31, 2020? If so, it's now time to register for kindergarten. To register, simply complete the online registration form at <u>eips.ca/kindergarten</u>.

To help families prepare, Elk Island Public Schools has put together an online toolkit—available at <u>eips.ca/kindergarten</u>—to make the transition as smooth as possible. The kit includes information on registration, important dates, programming options, what to expect, eligibility, how to find your designated school, transportation and more.

COMPLETE THE RETURNING STUDENT REGISTRATION: FEBRUARY 1-29

Elk Island Public Schools' (EIPS) returning student registration process is now open. All returning students must complete the online Returning Student Registration Form to confirm their child's enrolment in a school for the upcoming 2020-21 school year. Additionally, students who want to attend a non-designated school need to make that request through the returning student registration process—acceptance is based on available space. All returning EIPS students are required to complete the form by Feb. 29, 2020.

Access to the Returning Student Registration Form is provided through the <u>PowerSchool Parent Portal</u>. If you don't have a PowerSchool Parent Portal account, you need to set one up before Feb. 1, 2020.

4 Cs Of Family Recovery

I (we) didn't cause it..

Because we may struggle with shame/blame or feel responsible, we believe we should be able to fix "it". Through knowledge and understanding of substance abuse or addiction, we can come to a place of acceptance. We didn't cause it by any one person's presence, behaviours or words.

I (we) can't control it

This is a hard concept for a parent or family member to accept but the reality is – you have no control over the use or actions of your child. We hope that our values and belief system has a positive impact on our child and yet, we can't stop their use. Acceptance does not mean agreeing with the choices, it means surrendering control in an uncontrollable situation.

I (we) can't cure it.

National Institute on Drug Abuse defines addiction as a chronic relapsing brain disease that is characterized by compulsive drug seeking and use, despite harmful consequences. .. It is considered an illness and it requires its own recovery journey.

I (we) can change... PEP's mantra is "Change begins with me" ..

When we change, our circle of influence can change also.. Our focus should be on self in order to bring health and wellness. Families can change their perspective and offer support in a way that equally values their own self care needs and boundaries.

COUNSELLOR'S CORNER

February is the month for pink: Valentine's Day on February 14th and National Pink Shirt Day on Wednesday, February 26th for the purpose of raising awareness toward bullying. At WBO, we will be having a school assembly to support Pink Shirt Day on Thursday, February 27th. Students are encouraged to wear pink on both days. Schools work hard to provide a safe and caring school environment. With this in mind, how can we foster kindness to create more healthier self-esteem within our children? The act of kindness can go a very long way. Even small acts can make a difference for someone who may be having a bad day or is feeling down. Here is a list of the simple things we can do to show kindness to one another:

- **1. Smile** and make someone's day a little brighter.
- **2.** Look for ways you can promote peace by role modelling how to solve conflict peacefully. Find ways for everyone to feel like they are in a win-win situation and have been heard.
- **3. Just listen.** Listen to someone who is in need or is having a problem.
- **4.** Offer a hug or embrace.
- 5. Invite someone new into your friend group.
- **6. Send out a kind email** or card. Write a thank you note or leave happy notes around the house or classroom.
- **7. Give someone a genuine compliment.** Compliments can instantly change a person's mood.
- **8.** Help clean up, without being asked, help someone out in a practical way.

COUNSELLOR'S CORNER CONT'D

- 9. Hold open the door for the person behind you.
- 10. Encourage a friend or family member when they are uncertain or unmotivated.
- 11. Make peace with someone that has hurt you. Don't hold grudges.
- **12. Strike up a conversation with someone new.** Invite someone who you don't normally play with onto the playground.
- 13. Let someone into your lane while driving.
- **14. Give your time** to a friend or someone who needs it.
- 15. Say Thank You and Please every day without fail.
- **16. Say "I love you"** a little more often to your family.
- 19. Pause before you speak. Choose words with positive intention.
- **20.** Help someone get some rest (help with chores, unload the dishwasher, wash dishes, take out the trash, vacuum clean, etc.).
- **21. Pick up items** and return them to someone who did not know they dropped something.
- **22. Stop complaining.** Again, replace with positive thinking/thoughts.
- **23. Share something meaningful to someone:** loan a book, share the buddy bench with someone who is alone, include someone who looks left out.
- **24.** Check in an elderly neighbor. Help shovel snow or bring their garbage cans up for them.
- **25.** Say Hello or Good Morning to the people you pass.
- **26.** Wave to kids on the school bus or on the playground.

Kindness is something we choose. The more often we do it, the more natural it will become. As parents and educators, we are role models to our children/students.

DISTRICT NEWS

Measuring our Success: Complete the Accountability Pillar Survey

Once again, Alberta Education is conducting its Accountability Pillar Survey—an annual check up on the province's education system. Every year, Alberta Education conducts the survey to gather information about the quality of education provided by Alberta schools and school authorities. The survey looks at various measures such as engagement levels, student wellness, student outcomes, and the classroom(s) and school climate.

Throughout the month of February, Grade 4 students and teachers at **Westboro Elementary** are completing the survey online at the school. Student participation is voluntary and completely anonymous. Students are assigned a random username and password to ensure survey responses aren't linked to any individual student. The survey takes about 40 minutes to complete and is done within the school day during regular class time.

Additionally, parents and guardians of students in grades 4, 7, and 10 are also being surveyed—the province mailed the surveys in January. Again, the survey is anonymous and asks questions about experiences with your school. If you have a child in grades 4, 7 or 10, we highly encourage you to participate. The survey deadline is February 28, 2020.

Results from the Accountability Survey are provided to Elk Island Public Schools each May. The Division then uses that data to inform its three-year education plans, its annual school education plans and strategies for continuous improvement. The results are also shared with EIPS families and school communities each fall in the Division's *Combined Education Plan and Annual Education Results Report*.
