January 10: Classes Resume after extended Christmas Break

RETURN TO SCHOOL JANUARY 10

EIPS is in the process of revising its operational guidelines document and will send it to families by end of week. That will allow you to familiarize yourself with important changes made over the extended Christmas break. In the meantime, please be aware of the following:

- All individuals must still review the Alberta Health Daily Checklist with their children before sending them to school. **Students exhibiting any symptoms must remain at home until symptoms resolve.**
- In the case of a high number of student or staff absences, it may become necessary to move to temporary online learning. Should this happen, learning will take place using the Brightspace platform.
- Temporary online learning will only be used, as a last resort, when it isn't possible to continue in-person learning because of high student or staff absences. It's not being offered as an alternative to in-person learning.
- The Government of Alberta is providing rapid test kits and medical-grade masks for use by students and staff members. These are expected to start arriving in school divisions next week. At a minimum, it's highly recommended students wear medical-grade masks to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19 in schools.

We understand families may have additional questions. We ask for patience as we amend the operational guidelines, which will provide more comprehensive details. Thank you for your continued understanding and co-operation.

RETURNING STUDENT REGISTRATION FOR 2022-23

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) will once again conduct an online returning student registration process to confirm student registrations for the 2022-23 school year. Families of all returning students must complete the process to confirm the school their child plans to attend in the 2022-23 school year. Additionally, students who want to attend a non-designated school need to make that request through the returning student registration process—acceptance is based on available space. The 2022-23 returning student registration takes place between Feb. 1-28, 2022.

Access to the Returning Student Registration Form is provided through the <u>PowerSchool Parent Portal</u>. If you don't have a PowerSchool Parent Portal account, you need to set one up before Feb. 1, 2022.

Kindergarten registration opens for the 2022–23 school year on Feb. 1, 2022. INCLEMENT WEATHER

With the winter season well underway, we want to remind families to dress children appropriately for the weather when getting ready for school or the bus. The weather often changes unexpectedly throughout the day, so please select suitable outerwear and ensure your child is prepared for changing conditions.

If inclement weather conditions occur, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) will advise families of any bus cancellations using various communications tools, including automated-telephone messages, alerts posted on www.eips.ca and school websites, Twitter, Facebook, local radio stations and on the Ride 360 and Bus Status apps.

Decisions regarding bus cancellations are guided by EIPS' <u>Administrative Procedure 131: Inclement Weather</u>, which states: "school bus service may be suspended ... when there is a forecast or current temperature of -40 C including wind chill, in one or more regions." Other reasons for suspending or delaying school bus services include adverse weather and poor road conditions.

When school bus services are suspended, schools remain open to students. EIPS believes families have the right and responsibility to make choices for their children based on what uio they feel is safest during times of inclement weather.

WHAT TO DO WHEN THE WORDS DON'T STICK!

What to do when the words won't stick!

Do any of these describe your child:

- Practices every night for the spelling test, but still makes many errors?
- Makes constant spelling mistakes with the same words again and again?
- Is able to read a word one day, but is unable to decode that same word the next day?

Parents and teachers notice these things in children all the time! The research tells us that in order to remember the words and store them into our long term memory, our brain uses a process called Orthographic Mapping. This process involves the brain making connections between letter sounds and letter names. And guess what? Not all brains are wired to do this process automatically. While some children can be taught to learn a word with just 1-4 practices, it takes others up to 40 times to learn that same word. The good news is that there is a great way to practice word learning by using the Orthographic Mapping technique.

So, how can I work on this process at home?
