EIPS ASSURANCE REVIEW

Associate Superintendent Sandra Stoddard discussed the EIPS assurance review. The presentation outlined EIPS' assurance framework, engagement process, data analysis, Alberta Education assurance measures and included examples from EIPS' assurance review data from the 2020-21 school year. Trustee Report Trina Boymook

- November 8 MLA Walk arranged to for us to discuss any concerns that EIPS has that he should be aware of. We discussed concerns with delayed decision on what format that Sherwood Heights will be built through, and we are still waiting to hear from the Minister about our request to access more of our reserves to address Salisbury Composite storm water drainage issue.
- On November 21, the Minister of Education announced that the schools approved for design will no proceeding as P3 and will move forward as design builds. This is exciting news for the Sherwood Heights replacement school.
- On November 17, at the public Board meeting the Board was presented with feedback received through various public engagement sessions to deal with cleaning up some of our junior high attendance areas. No recommendation or decision will be made about the junior high attendance area until the spring. Senior Administration needs more time to complete two other public engagement before the Superintendent will determine his recommendation to the Board. Given that the recommendation is now projected to come after the 2023-24 registration, there will be no changes to the junior high boundaries for the 2023-24 school year.
- A summary of the Logos public engagements will be presented for information at the December 15 Board meeting. No decision will be made at this meeting.
- EIPS mental health pilot proposal was approved and we will be receiving \$1.94 over 2 years.
- On November 4, Superintendent Liguori has announced his intent to retire at the end of the school year. The Board will be undertaking a Superintendent search.
